

Parker honors leaders Who make م difference

Every February since 2009, Councilwoman Lizette Parker has celebrated Black History Month by honoring outstanding local African-American leaders.

Each event teatures a different theme. The first theme in 2009 was to celebrate African-American Firsts. Parker said that her impetus to present the first program was twofold: the election of Barackt Obama, the first African-American president, and the death that year of Teaneck's first African-American

mayor Bernard Brooks, the first in African-American councilmember y Isaac McNart, first African-American, compolice officer Frederick Greene vs. (died in 2008) and one of the first sy African-American teachers. Alice e. Benekin (died in 2007).

t ically in size and significance each year. Parker noted that in 2009 Assemblyman Gordon Johnson was the highest public official to speak. Saturday's speakers included U.S. Sen. Robert Menendez, Congressmen Steve Rothman and William Pascrell and a representative from U.S. Sen. Frank Lautenberg's office.

Parker said, noting that this year's event drew approximately 250 guests. Planning for the event usually begins just after Thanksgiving, she said.
